Canadian Islamic History Month



October 1st marks the beginning of Islamic History Month. It is an opportunity to celebrate the rich heritage of Muslim Canadians and to recognize their contributions to society and their many achievements in the arts, sports, academics, sciences, literature, and public life. It is also a time to acknowledge the ongoing challenges and barriers that Muslim Canadians face.

The Parliament of Canada proclaimed October Canadian Islamic History Month in 2007 in recognition of the significant contributions made by Muslim Canadians to Canada and the world. Islamic History Month has since been proclaimed in provinces and municipalities across Canada with community members and organizations hosting numerous events each year to bring communities together to share and learn from one another.

The theme set by <u>Islamic History Month Canada (IHMC)</u> for 2023 is *Celebrating Muslim Women in the Arts & Sciences* to honour the "contributions of Muslim Women through the ages and in Canada their influence on the progress of the Arts, Sciences, and Society."

Women's History Month

October is Women's History Month in Canada, a time to celebrate the women and girls from our past, and our present, who are contributing to a better, more inclusive Canada.



The Government of Canada designated October as Women's History Month in 1992,

marking the beginning of an annual celebration of the outstanding achievements of women and girls throughout Canada's history.

The 2023 theme *Through Her Lens: Celebrating the Diversity of Women*, recognizes the importance of the achievements and contributions of women from diverse backgrounds. The theme focuses on the unique perspectives, experiences, and challenges faced by Indigenous women; women from 2SLGBTQI+ communities; and newcomer, racialized, and migrant women.

On December 19, 2011, United Nations General Assembly adopted Resolution 66/170 to declare October 11 as the International Day of the Girl Child, to recognize girls' rights and the unique challenges girls face around the world.

The International Day of the Girl Child focuses attention on the need to address the challenges girls face and to promote girls' empowerment and the fulfilment of their human rights.

The UNICEF focus for 2023 is *Invest in Girls' Rights: Our Leadership, Our Well-being.*

Persons Day

October 18, 2023

October 18th is Persons Day in Canada, a day to commemorate 1929 decision in the Persons Case that first recognized select groups of Canadian women as "persons" under the law and granted them the right to be appointed to



the Senate. While these rights were not extended to all women, notably Indigenous women and women of Asian heritage and descent, the ruling paved the way for women's increased participation in public and political life and was a crucial moment in advancing gender equality in Canada.

The observance is generally associated with a group of women activists including Emily Murphy, Nellie McClung, Louise McKinney, Irene Parlby and Henrietta Muir Edwards, popularly known as the Famous Five.
